

WHAT NOW IN OUR DAYLILY GARDENS

December is here and we cannot do too much outside. Weather determines that. Perhaps there is a little clean-up to be done. I know I have some dead tomato vines to dispose of and some leaves to get off the daylily beds. I have found that if you mulch daylilies with a bunch of leaves. On warm sunny days, aphids will magically appear, with their ant attendants, and eat the fans at the base, truly sucking the life juice out of the plants. Deer are still coming around looking for daylilies to eat. We saw a big buck eat pine needles lower branches. Did not know they would eat pines! (I still need a fence to keep out the deer.)

Here are the December stats from the last 3 years temperature wise and otherwise. Adequate rainfall, some snow flurries usually, but no accumulation, frosty mornings, and some windy chilly days. The lack of good snow cover is hard on the daylilies, as the snow protects them from the low temps. Starting with 2018, it was a comparatively warm December. Using the high temperature, 3 days made it into the 30's; 10 days into the 40's; 12 days into the 50's; and six into the 60's. That's pretty good. Leucojum bulfs Helen purchased from Summer Dawn broke dormancy toward the end of the month, poking up over one inch. This month so far, we had those two early freezes which turned our daylilies yellow and brown.

In 2017, again low temps. were hard on the daylilies. 4 days topped out in the 20's; 8 in the 30's; 6 in the 40's; 3 in the 60's; and 10 in the 50's. Early daffodil varieties broke dormancy the latter part of the month six inches or more.

Highs in 2016 were 3 in the 20's; 5 in the 30's; 17 in the 40's; 4 in the 50's and 1 each day hit 60 and 70° for a high. Frost, flurries and rain were still common.

December is always a good month to plant bulbs in our area. The ground is not frozen and so is workable.
