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DSL MEETING February 21, 2022

Board Meeting:

Richard called the meeting to order at 6:20 PM.

ITEM NO. 1 Old Business:

- 1. Chris and Bev will perform the 2021 DSL annual financial audit.
- 2. The 2016 National Convention Hybridizer Donation plants need to be dug up from Bill and Chris Schardein's host beds. Volunteers will be needed to help with this effort in order to have plants ready for sale at the Bullitt County Master Gardener's Garden Art and Plant Sale on April 30th. A target date of April 29th has been set for the dig. Doris Stonska's host plants labels have been lost making it difficult to identify for removal at this time. Once in bloom an effort will be made to identify and list available plants. Richard suggested that the club should create a master list of all plants available.

ITFM NO. 2 New Business:

- 1. Richard asked Chris if she would accept the responsibility to Chair the 2024 Regionals for DSL. Chris accepted with the caveat that she would receive enough support in this effort. She also wanted members to consider the same new format that LADS first proposed. Participants were responsible for their own hotel stays and transportation to the various gardens listed for viewing. Further discussion will be needed as to how to implement the process.
- 2. Chris announced that Scott Elliott, ADS President, is on a quest to visit many of the display gardens across the country. He already has Region 10 gardens scheduled for his tour. Also, the upcoming National Conventions to keep on your radar are in Nashville, TN June 2023, Oklahoma City, OK, June 2024, and Seattle, WA July 2025.
- 3. Don reported for Claudia, who was absent this evening, that the speaker for our next meeting will be Janet Smith of the Kentucky Orchid Society.
- 4. Richard passed on Don's suggestion that we ask all our members to bring a dish for our potluck break to balance out the number of members that are present for each meeting.

- 6. Richard asked all our members to bring a dish for our potluck break to balance out the number of members that are present for each meeting.
- 7. Due to a majority approval, our DSL Flower Show will take place at Mid-City Mall on June 18th.
- 8. Don announced that our guest speaker for our next meeting will be Janet Smith from the Kentucky Orchid Society.
- 9. Door prizes were drawn thanks to the generous donations by members.
- 10. Richard asked for a motion to adjourn the meeting. Bev motioned for the general meeting to adjourn, and the motion was seconded by Ron.

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MARCH MAGIC by Richard Porter

It is magical! Daffodils and forsythia bushes start blooming. Perennials break dormancy! Or is it March Mania? I am checking the garden (when it is not raining and mushy) every few days to see what's going on! What's blooming? What has survived the Winter? And when are those calla lily bulbs coming? And when shopping at any store with a garden center or area, are there any new stocked items - bulbs, grass seed, etc. Yep! It is mania!!!

Last month I was lamenting that not even the lowly crocus was showing itself by the 8th day of the month. So, of course, crocus started blooming on the next day! They are still blooming over the next 30 days since then. Small white ones, intense yellow gold ones, delicate lavenders and no doubt the big fancy striped ones are up next. Not to worry! The Lenten Rose started to bloom greenish white and maroon flowers on Feb. 27th, and so appropriately during Lent, are still blooming well. Deer do not eat hellebores! Not sure why, as we have seen deer eating the lower branches of pine trees and that awful invasive euonomus (sic) vine during winters when there is not a lot of forage. They don't eat daffodils either.

Typical blooming this month: trees (feel the pollen); Bradford pears; lots of daffodils; hyacinths; English primroses; creeping phlox; iris reticulata (the little creeping types); iris Harmony; Star Flowers; star magnolias; and trilliums toward the end of the month. Breaking dormancy: Peonies; climbing roses; hostas; black raspberries (yummy); barberry bushes (so sharp); monarda (bee balm); liatris (gay feather); clematis vines; Solomon's seals; Giant asters; German bearded iris; spuria iris; and crabapples AND DAYLILIES! Inch by inch, the daylilies are doing their stuff!

Had to miss Mid Winter Symposium and Region Two Winter Symposium this year. That's a bummer. The weeds are starting to grow too. On warmer days, it is so tempting to do "head start" weeding, late month.

METEROLOGICAL/WEATHER: Lots of rain, with some low frosty morning temperatures here and there. About half the month, daytime highs get into the 60-70° range. Two March days in 2020 hit in the 80°'s. Almost balancing out that two days the preceding year (2019) which only topped out in the 20°s. In 2019, coming back from Region 2 Winter Meeting in Indianapolis, on March 3, Louisville got 3 inches of snow. It closed schools and the court system.

St. Patrick's Day will be on the 17th of March, like always. Happy St. Patrick's Day! The full moon will be the next day, Friday, March 18th. Keep on gardening.

Our speaker for March meeting

Jan Smith learned to love plants while growing up on a small farm in southern Jefferson County. She was a 4H member and in high school won the 1964 &1965 top National Junior Horticultural Association prizes. Her horticultural efforts were for many years limited to garden vegetables, houseplants and a few perennials. In about 2015, a bit of internet research led to success in reblooming Phalaenopsis orchids, which she had collected over the years. Eager to learn more, she joined the Kentucky Orchid Society. As her knowledge grew, so did her collection and eventually it outgrew the metal shelves that had been erected in the basement for orchid culture. These days she grows her 300+ orchids in a real greenhouse which she calls her 'happy place".

She has served on the board of the KOS for 6-7 years and is currently immediate past president of the organization. She enjoys growing plants of all sorts, including daylilies, hydrangeas, annuals, vegetables, houseplants and, of course, orchids. In her "free time", she is mother of five grown children, grand-mom to two little boys, and has been in cardiology practice in Louisville for almost 40 years.
